



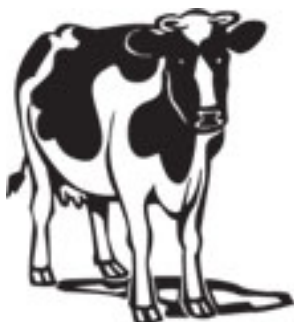

**From the Rector**

**Our Lenten Sacrifice:  
Giving Up Paper/  
Taking On Conservation**

Traditionally, as an act of fasting and penitence we Christians have given up something near and dear to us for Lent. It should feel like a sacrifice – letting go of that idolatrous food or thing. We should miss it in such a way that we come to realize its benefits for us or against us. Accordingly, we change our behavior around that which we believe we cannot live without. In place of it we take something on which will better our lives and the world around us.

I am delighted to report to you that the entire St. David’s congregation is being invited into a parish wide Lenten sacrifice. The wardens, vestry and I are unanimously commending to you the giving up of paper and the taking on of better planet saving behaviors.

During Lent we will be diligent about limiting our paper usage. We will be using the Book of Common Prayer and the Hymnal 1982 for our Sunday services. There will be no worship bulletin or readings and prayers/announcement inserts. All the readings, prayers and announcements will be sent to each household via Email or ground mail before each Sunday. A copy will be available on the bulletin board in the parish hall.

We will be using less paper during Coffee Hour and other fellowship events as well. The office will be limiting its paper use as well. We are checking into increasing our capability of conference calling for meetings so that people do not have to drive and use up gas. Wow, I can’t wait to participate in meetings while sitting back in my lounge chair!

This will be an experiment through Lent which will be evaluated in order to gauge its implications for more permanent use in the future. Your leadership team has also established an Ecology Committee that will begin in earnest the work that God is giving us to do in order to be better stewards of creation. The ravaging of our planet by our unchecked appetites for its resources is not new news. The fact that we feel passionate enough to do something about this as the Body of Christ is

new news. We pray that God will help us turn this new news into the good news of taking much better care of this fragile earth, our island home.

I invite you into this Lenten sacrifice – a saving act on behalf of God’s creation.

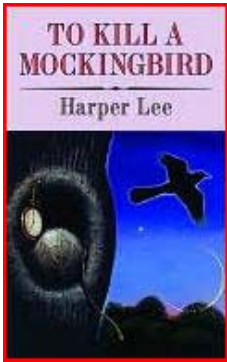
**NEW MEMBER/INQUIRERS CLASS TO BEGIN**

The title, TO KILL A MOCKINGBIRD, has symbolic weight. In this story of innocent victims destroyed through contact with evil, the “mockingbird” comes to represent the idea of innocence.

## NOTES FROM SR. SHANE

Welcome to Lent! Some people dread it, but Lent is a great time to clean out your closets and your mind, to let fresh air into your home and your heart. We have lots of chances to do this in March.

On March 8, three women from the Church of the Redeemer in Morristown will lead an Adult Forum on the *Good Shepherd Home in Cameroon*. They have all been there, and will be sharing their experience and their hopes for the future. Come and hear stories of amazing children and adults working for a new future. Learn how you can help.

*The Women's Group is helping the Good Shepherd Home* in a concrete way. Sr. Mary Lynne, CSJB will go to Cameroon on April 15. She will take 10 suitcases of supplies for the home. The Women's Group is sponsoring a suitcase. It costs \$150 to ship a 50-lb. suitcase. We will fill it with children's books and educational supplies, and raise the money to send it. If you would like to help with shipping costs, your checks to CSJB-Good Shepherd Home are tax deductible. If you would like to donate books or supplies, we are looking for French flash cards, math games, sketch books, and books on science and nature (esp. African nature) and different cultures around the world. French language flash cards are available on-line from amazon.com, barnesandnoble.com, and borders.com. Doctor Seuss, Curious George, and their friends are also welcome. Starting March 1 we will have a suitcase in the narthex for you to place your donations.

*North Porch* is now a year-round ministry at St. David's. They especially need:

*Diapers (newborn size, and sizes 4 and 5)*

*Baby shampoo, wipes, oil, powder, and cream*

## PLEASE STOP HERE AND PONDER THESE QUESTIONS

Before reading any further, please ponder the following questions:

1. Who have been your mentors in life?
2. Who are the men and women who came alongside you at particular junctures in time to encourage you into becoming your unique self?

Whether they were teachers, peers, supervisors, colleagues, friends or even strangers, people come into our lives invited or not to teach us the next steps we need in order to discover the particular ways that are ours to love in the world.

Once we are able to identify such mentors in our lives, we realize the importance of their presence. We are also free to begin acknowledging when we have mentored others either in the workplace or as they become parents, in early retirement or when people are wrestling with significant changes of any kind. It requires a willingness to keep our eyes open and come alongside people when they either need or request support. Sometimes mentoring is informal. Other times it becomes formalized or set for a period of time.

Members can be people or communities. St. David's has been a mentoring community for many during her history. Perhaps now more than ever, though, we need to consider this particular way of loving that is ours to claim and live into more fully. We mentor young people and children, strangers who become friends, people in the midst of loss and change, couples seeking marriage/civil union and families who are burying their loved ones. Because Americans live busy, complex and often isolated lives, mentoring communities such as ours take on a particular importance. A worship service of excellence is a wonderful anchor for people to ground them in daily life. Yet having a layer of support beyond that is imperative. This can happen in a variety of ways through small group ministries where friendship and learning flourish.

But what about the newest members or visitors to our parish? How do they even figure out what is available and how to get there? You are being invited to consider helping newcomers find their way at St. David's by joining in a specific ministry to guide or mentor them for six months. This will be an opportunity to form friendship, to listen to people's questions and guide them to other people or opportunities that are aligned with their needs/interest. The goal is to help each person discover her/his own particular way of loving and serving Christ during the first few months of participation in this parish.

## PREPARATION BEGINS FOR ROUND TWO

It has begun. Plans for the 2009 Hunger Cycle Tour on May 2 are shaping up, and not a second too soon.

Why? Well, there are lots and lots of needy people in this world and, unlike last year, many of them live near us. We are committed to the Millennium Development Goals of greatly reducing world poverty by the year 2015. However, we are also committed to our local neighbors who have been severely impacted by the economic recession. So, this year's profits will be distributed as follows:

- 75% will be directed to projects that provide long-term sources of clean drinking water throughout Latin America
- 25% to a "community chest" to support our local neighbors in need

The Episcopal Relief and Development Fund will administer the clean water projects while David DeSmith will be responsible for the "community chest" fund.

What is different with this year's event?

- Our Bishop Beckwith will be riding!!! We expect many others in the diocese to join him (and us).
- We expect a 50% increase in attendance!
- The weather forecast is for sunny skies with temperatures reaching almost 80 degrees.
- Live music will be provided by Pennsylvania's well known Chester County Lawmen band (see: [www.chestercountylawmen.com](http://www.chestercountylawmen.com)).
- Door prizes for the riders.
- Our website is already up and running ([www.hungercycletour.com](http://www.hungercycletour.com)).

BUT, none of the above can happen without some more help. Last year we raised \$8,000 by our efforts. It was a terrific event and a masterful operation by St. David's. ## **DIOCESAN CONVENTION**

David DeSmith, Pat Crane, Mary Stuart Hawk and John Simonelli represented St. David's as deputies to the 135th annual convention of the Diocese of Newark at the Parsippany Hilton on January 31st. All 110 parishes of the diocese were represented, as well as representatives of religious orders, the press, and invited guests – more than 500 persons all told.

Since this convention was just a single day, rather than the customary two, there was no guest preacher and little time for socializing, but amazingly we accomplished everything that was on a rather long agenda and in the allotted time.

The overall theme of the Convention was Imagination, Innovation and Impact, and in his principal address (which was his sermon at the opening Eucharist) Bishop Beckwith emphasized the pain in our common life right now and why we have to help each other get through our present 'wilderness experience' of poverty, financial uncertainty, hunger and homelessness by finding God's unique abundance in the wilderness – something the Bishop called the manna of everyday experience – and by breaking down the barriers between our communities that separate us.

The diocese has a balanced budget for 2009, but unfortunately it comes at the expense of cutting back on programs, outreach, personnel and benefits. The Bishop would like to see the parishes in the diocese go back to the 50-50 giving model that the diocese adopted in 1989, and to this end he will be appointing a Stewardship Task Force, whose ultimate goal is to create a diocesan community of greater collaboration.

In addition to voting for candidates for various diocesan offices, deputies voted on a number of important resolutions, including resolutions on the condemnation of torture, abolishing the death penalty in NJ, human trafficking, and support of marriage equality. In true Episcopal form, a number of the resolutions that were originally put on the consent calendar (meaning they would not be debated) were debated at length, while a number of the 'debatable' resolutions passed without comment.

During the lunch hour a number of workshops were offered, and we divided up to take advantage of several of them, with David attending one on capital campaigns, John one on planned giving, and Pat and Mary Stuart one on church growth. All were excellent and instructive offerings.

A highlight of the convention was a 'mission minute' – a short multi media presentation given by Mike Odian and Rodger Pisani on behalf of the 2009 St. David's bike tour to raise funds for the Millennium Development Goals – both locally and internationally. Mike was in top form, the presentation was well received, and the Bishop was persuaded to participate this year as a rider.
