#### From our Priest, The Rev. Jon M. Richardson

Dear Friends,

February is the month when our culture turns to thoughts of love – in its most basic and least interesting form: the love that is defined by overpriced chocolates, and flowers, and cards, and all the rest... Children are indoctrinated into this cultural observance of expressing love through consumer habits in the earliest years in school. But it doesn't take much maturity to begin to learn that love is really more than all of



that. It's richer and deeper than the sentiments that the now-absent Necco Conversation Hearts could ever convey. They were certainly sweet and delicious, but still lacking.

We, in the church, know that love is even deeper and richer than that. Love is the greatest gift we have from God and our greatest tribute to God, in return. As Christians, there is no better way to express our faith than to show signs of God's love to the people God has put in front of us.

But of course, none of this is news to any of us. We hear about love all year – in the stories we read from the Bible, in our reflections of how we're called to live our lives, in our efforts at exercising the mission of the church through our service to others and through spreading the good news of God's love...

The incredible thing about the month of February is not that it's about love – for us, every month is about love. 

In 1922, Count Rostov is deemed an unrepentant aristocrat by a Bolshevik tribunal. He is sentenced to house arrest in the Metropol, a grand hotel

across the street from the Kremlin. Rostov has never worked a day in his life, and must now live in an attic room while some of the most tumultuous decades in Russian history are unfolding outside the hotel's doors. Unexpectedly his reduced circumstances provide him a doorway into a much larger world of emotional discovery. Through the Count's eyes we will experience the many changes in Russia, from Stalin to Khrushchev, as the hotel is the home for many meetings and dinners of the topranking members of the politburo. A friendship with an eight-year-old girl, Nina, will bring color to his life that will last for over thirty years.

A Gentleman in Moscow evokes an era of the tsar when Moscow rivals Paris and London as a destination for elite classes throughout Europe. A member of the landed aristocracy prior the Bolshevik Revolution, Count Rostov is well versed in literature and history, and appears to be a true renaissance man. Through his relationships, Towles shows the Count to have a genuine soft spot in his heart as well, turning him into a truly memorable character.

This book has something for everyone; humor, food and wine pairings, amazing friendships, much history, literature, architecture and philosophy and even American movies.

#### Vestry Meeting Highlights January 16, 2019

John Simonelli led the opening prayer and Jon Richardson and various Vestry members shared what had inspired them lately.

We discussed receiving many favorable comments from parishioners on the 2019 annual meeting, particularly the inclusion of the vestry meeting highlights for the year in the booklet, and a concern on where to find the Vestry Highlights on the parish website (a new drop down menu containing them is now on the parish website). We also adopted a new policy that the Vestry will only deal with non-anonymous feedback at meetings, and that sensitive issues should be addressed one on one with the priest.

Stewardship reported that all plans are finalized for the food and wine pairing on January 26, the Fish & Chips Dinner will be April 13, and the Silent Auction & Beefsteak will be October 26. It was also noted that a donation resulting from pastoral care of \$100 was received, which will go into the Outreach fund.

Outreach reported that six \$200 checks will go out this week to the 5 food pantries we support and North Porch; that thank you letters have been received from Seaman's Church Institute and the pantries and North Porch; that the Vestry Christmas outreach letter resulted in generous donations which were divided between Episcopal Relief & Development, Family Promise, and Willing Hands. Jon Richardson also reported that the Outreach Page on the parish website has been heavily updated, showing in-kind, hands-on, and financial outreach.

We gave thanks for John Simonelli for hosting the pre-convention meeting; for Kathy and Steve Kent for the pairing event; for Nancy Moody for playing on Christmas Day; for Sal and the Choir for all their Christmas music; for the church 'greeners' and 'ungreeners', especially Mike and Deb Roehrer; for the new and returning Vestry members; for Mary Harbinsky for agreeing to be clerk AND a vestry member; and for Mary-Esther Arther and Bonnie Hook for joining us in new ways.

We reviewed the December Quickbooks reports, noting that we ended the year in the black, and voted to accept them.

The Property Committee reported that the sanctuary lighting job is complete, The sanctuary lighting upgrade has been completed; that the outdoor lighting problem has been resolved; that are seeking a second quote for air-conditioning the skylight room; that they are working to re-mount or replace the handicapped restroom door; that due to the weather there has not been any progress on drive-way visibility; and that quotes will be obtained for replacing St. David's direction signs on area roads.

We amended and approved the February calendar.


