

### From our Priest, The Rev. Jon M. Richardson

Dear Friends,

When I first moved to New Jersey more than 14 years ago, one of the things that struck me was how many colloquialisms and popular ideas suddenly began making sense to me. The first one was the idea that Labor Day was the unofficial "end of summer". For one thing, where I grew up, school started weeks before Labor Day. But the other reality was that in Louisiana, it was hot for so much of the year that Labor Day didn't even signify any change in the weather. But in New Jersey, school didn't start until after Labor Day, and there was a palpable shift



in the weather. Even though it can still get hot later in September and into October, there would be a shift in the air after Labor Day. It wasn't cool yet, but there were hints that cooler weather was finally coming. It was eye opening for me.

Another of those revelations was the old expression, "April showers bring May flowers". This was a pattern of weather and biology that I'd always heard, and even recited, but didn't really understand from growing up in a place without distinct seasons. But in New Jersey, April was a really wet month. And what's more: the ground did seem to explode with color at the start of May! On the campus of Drew University, the big thing was the daffodils. The campus, affectionately known as "The Forest", was dull and gray through the winter, but come May, everything was lush and green and dotted with yellow flowers everywhere we looked.

It wasn't until then that I really began to understand the effect that our physical surroundings had on living into the seasons of the church. The gray of winter is already beginning to melt away, but by Easter, we should at least be beginning to see Spring coming into bloom all around us. There's a comfortable predictability about it.

We are often less comfortable about the predictability of our faith. When we're in the winters of our lives – those dull and gray periods when things seem bleak; or, those Lenten seasons of our lives when we feel like we're wandering in the wilderness, separate from God and from each other – it can be hard to remember that Spring is coming; that Easter is coming.


But despite the ways that our faith is lacking, the cycle continues. In the earth around us, the dull and the gray will, once again, give way to lush green and flowers. In the church, the wilderness of Lent will, once again, give way to the promise of Easter. And the same is true in our own lives. Like the cliché says, "If you're going through hell, keep going." Or, to put it in more of a theological context, St. Theresa of Avila famously said, "All shall be well, all shall be well, all manner of things shall be well."

A popular expression these days is to say, "The struggle is real." And it is. But so is the relief. Our faith teaches us – and the earth teaches us – that the struggle is never the end of the story. Life finds a way. And it will again.

#### **Vestry Meeting Highlights February 27, 2019**

Mary-Esther Arther led the opening prayer and Marty Stanton shared remembrances of his uncle, Brother Nivard, who was a Trappist Monk, and also played a selection of Thomas Merton speaking on MLK.

We discussed a concern from a parishioner that there is too much "abandoned furniture" in the skylight room and classrooms, which the Vestry agreed was the case and which the Property Committee will deal with.

Stewardship reported that the Fish & Chips Dinner will be April 13 at a cost of \$20 a person, that parishioners will be asked to bake cookies for dessert, that the event will be posted on the outdoor sign for at least 3 weeks prior, and that chicken dinners will also be available at the same price.

Outreach recommended that the Easter outreach offering be designated to go to Willing Hands, Family Promise, and Episcopal Relief and Development, allowing us to support local, regional, and world outreach, which the Vestry voted to approve. They reported that six \$200 checks will go out in March to the 5 food pantries we support and North Porch; that the ingathering for the Linus Project will be Pentecost Sunday, that the outreach page on the parish website has been updated; that they would like to dedicate one Sunday a month to presenting information about a different are of St. David's outreach; and that we have received a request from PATCH to provide hands-on workshops for children of incarcerated parents.

We gave thanks for Sal and the choir for their beautiful anthems; for our Diocesan Convention Deputies; for Ed Horton and John Simonelli for their work on the Parish Audit and Parochial Report; for Lee Moody for his clarinet solo in church; for Laurie Pisani for joining a worship team; for the Transition Team; for the congregation for allowing Michael to use the parish hall for his play rehearsals; and for Bonnie Hook for producing the year-end statements and on time.

We reviewed and accepted the January Quickbooks reports.

We voted to approve the 2018 Parochial Report and the 2018 Parish Audit.

We supported Jon Richardson's suggestion to use Rite 1 for both Sunday services during Lent.

The Transition Team distributed their final report, noting that we have had a very good year with Jon as priest-in-charge, that Jon and Michael are very happy being with us, and that a packet of documents including the Vestry Mutual Ministry Review, the 2019 Budget, the 2019 Annual Meeting Report, the 2018 Parochial Report, and the 2018 Parish Audit will be sent to Bishop Hughes.

The Property Committee has been investigating the poor outdoor lighting and will be replacing all of the CDLs with LED bulbs, which will remedy the situation. Quotes have been received for replacing the handicapped bathroom door, which the Vestry approved.

With the full support of the Vestry, Senior Warden John Simonelli will be meeting with Bishop Hughes and Canon Jacobs to discuss the possibility of calling Jon Richardson as our rector.

The Property Committee reported that the remainder of the outdoor lights will be replaced with LED bulbs, that the handicapped bathroom door and flower sacristy rack have been replaced; that a second quote for A/C for the large skylight room has been received; and that a Needs and Assessment List for the property has been prepared and priorities will be established.

We amended and approved the April calendar.
