



From our Rector, The Rev. Jon M. Richardson

Dear Friends,

A few weeks ago, the real estate office where Michael works opened a new location. I went with Michael to the Grand Opening celebration partly as a supportive spouse, partly because I had heard there would be a lot of delicious food (and there was!), and partly because it can be good for the church to have the parish priest around at occasions of community celebration like that.



I met a lot of Michael's colleagues, but one in particular was so excited to talk to me about the church she attends. She told me what worship was like. She told me about the ways that she serves on Sunday mornings. She told me about her pastor and about all the outreach ministries that her church was involved in. The thing that impressed me, however, was this clearly wasn't her first rodeo. She got started talking with me because she knew that I would be a receptive audience, but that's not why she was comfortable talking about her church. She was comfortable talking about it because she'd done so before. Many times.

While her particular church is certainly more "evangelical" than I would typically be comfortable with (I am an Episcopalian, after all...), I did find that I really admired her willingness and skill at talking about it with complete strangers.

I met with a couple recently who have been thinking about visiting St. David's and wanted to know more about the church. My conversation was a lot like the one I had with Michael's colleague. I went on and on about what to expect, and how kind the people are, and about all the different kinds of ministry we do at St. David's. But even being a priest, after it was over, I found myself almost feeling embarrassed. Had it sounded like a sales pitch? It was authentic, but did it come across that way?

Talking about the church isn't something most Episcopalians are comfortable doing. And while I don't think it would be genuine for us to try to emulate evangelical Christianity, I do think we could learn a bit from their willingness to engage in evangelism – which is really just about sharing good news.

And we have a lot of "good news" at St. David's. We're small, but we're strong. We do more to help others and to build up our own parish family than a lot of churches much larger than us do. We have a lot to be proud of and we shouldn't be embarrassed to talk about it.

I encourage you to try talking about St. David's with someone you normally wouldn't. I will, too. It may not be easy at first, but it could become easy with practice. And we have a lot of good news to share!



Vestry Meeting Highlights October 16, 2019

Marty Stanton led the opening prayer and Mike Roehrer spoke on how he was inspired by Tom Lehmann, a man confined to a wheelchair since he was a teenager who overcame his difficulties, found Jesus, was always upbeat, and became a gospel message to those around him

We discussed concerns from the congregation – the condition of the rug in the large skylight room.

The Stewardship Commission reported that we netted \$320 from the parish yard sale; that many pledge forms have still not been received, which the Vestry will follow up on with personal notes; that things are set for the auction on October 26; that tickets will go on sale for A Christmas Carol on November 10; that the Community Service of Thanksgiving is on Sunday, November 24th at the Kinnelon Reformed Church; and that the 2020 Thrill of the Grill will be on Saturday, August 29th.

The Outreach Committee reported that with this month's disbursements we will have sent out \$6,000 in outreach donations this year; that Rev. Sharon Hausman's sermon and presentation on prison ministry was well received; and that the list of requested outreach Christmas gifts will be in the November newsletter.

We gave thanks for Nancy Moody for coordinating the garage sale; for John Simonelli for donating his garage sale profits to the church; for Mary Harbinsky for her help at the garage sale and for coordinating the baskets for the auction; for Marty and Candace Stanton for driving and serving at St. Paul's Men's Shelter; for Michael Kidney for painting the new Willing Hands TV room and new chapel; for Guy Baskinger for his help with the move; for the well-behaved animals at the Blessing of Animals service; and for Jean Boranian for joining the choir and volunteering to be a reader.

We reviewed and accepted the September Quickbooks reports.

We agreed on Saturday, November 23rd for the Vestry MMR to be led by the Rev Canon Margo Clark, Canon for Congregational Life.

The Property Committee reported that plans for the Fall Clean-up Day are well under way; that the dampness issue in the basement is being addressed; and that they have been discussing a reboot of Adopt a Project in 2020.

BRAVE NEW WORLD, ALDOUS HUXLEY

DISCUSSION LEADER – JENNIFER TREVISAN

BRAVE NEW WORLD takes place in a futuristic society in which people are grown as nearly identical embryos in bottles and conditioned to remove strong desires, the need for human relationships and strong emotions. BRAVE NEW WORLD, originally published in 1932, presents Aldous Huxley's vision of the future - of a world utterly transformed. Through the most efficient scientific and psychological engineering, people are genetically designed to be passive and therefore consistently useful to the ruling class. This powerful work of speculative fiction sheds a blazing critical light on the present and is considered to be Huxley's most enduring masterpiece.

Aldous Huxley's profoundly important classic of world literature, *Brave New World* is a searching vision of an unequal, technologically-advanced future where humans are genetically bred, socially indoctrinated, and pharmaceutically anesthetized to passively uphold an authoritarian ruling order--all at the cost of our freedom, full humanity, and perhaps also our souls. "A genius who spent his life decrying the onward march of the Machine, Huxley was a man of incomparable talents: equally an artist, a spiritual seeker, and one of history's keenest observers of human nature and civilization. Written in the shadow of the rise of fascism during the 1930s, *Brave New World* likewise speaks to today's world dominated by mass-entertainment, technology, medicine and pharmaceuticals, the arts of persuasion, and the hidden influence of elites. 
